The Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) is a community service and work-based job training program for older Americans. Authorized by the Older Americans Act, the program provides training for low-income, unemployed seniors. Participants also have access to employment assistance through American Job Centers. SCSEP participants gain work experience in a variety of community service activities at non-profit and public facilities, including schools, hospitals, day-care centers, and senior centers. Participants work an average of 20 hours a week, and are paid the highest of federal, state or local minimum wage.

what is SCSEP – Senior Community Service Employment Program	
☐ SCSEP is a job training program exclusively for unemployed (low incom	ne)
people, age 55 or older, with low employment prospects.	
☐ Participants are placed in part-time community service assignments at local organizations (called Host Agencies) to gain experience and increasing marketable skills needed to transition to a permanent job.	

Goals of SCSEP

☐ Upgrade job skills and work experience through hands—on experience at a
Host Agency.
☐ Learn new job skills that are needed in today's workplace.

☐ Serve communities while expanding skills and earning an income.

□ Paid training while preparing and seeking a job.

Qualification for SCSEP

☐ Age 55 or older.

☐ Must be unemployed at time of application and enrollment.

☐ Family income must fall within 125% of federal poverty guidelines.

Training Hours

The participant is assigned and commits to actively participate in SCSEP for an agreed number of hours per week. These hours may fluctuate throughout the program year due to many variables that govern the budget of SER SCSEP.

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A little history about April Fool's Day

April Fool's Day, also called All Fool's Day, and is celebrated every April 1st in the United States. We play small tricks on friends and strangers alike on the first of April. One common trick is to point down at someone's shoe and say"your shoe laces are untied. The' fool's errands 'we play on people are practical jokes. Most April Fool's jokes are in good fun and not meant to harm anyone. While it is not officially recognized as a holiday, many celebrate by pranking; it is unknown exactly how the tradition originated. Some cultures saw it as the first day of spring. The Feast of Fools was a term given to many medieval festivals celebrated during the fifth and sixteenth centuries in Europe. The tradition of practical jokes had been well established by 1632, when legend states that the Duke of Lorraine and his wife escaped a prison at Nantes by dressing as peasants, walking out the front gate. When the guards were alerted to the escape, they laughed at what they thought was an April fool's prank. In England, jokes are played only in the morning. It was considered bad luck to play a practical joke on someone in the afternoon. In Portugal, April fool's Day falls before lent. So people throw flour at their friend's. In India, people play jokes and smear colors on one another celebrating the arrival of spring.

Arbor Day

The first Arbor Day took place on April 10, 1872 in Nebraska. Julius Sterling Morton, a Nebraska journalist and politician worked to improve agricultural techniques throughout the United States. Morton felt that Nebraska's landscape and economy would benefit from the wide-scale planting of trees. He set an example himself planting orchards, shade trees and wind breaks on his own farm. A second Arbor day took place in 1884 and made it an annual legal holiday in 1885, using April 22nd to coincide with Morton's birthday. In the years following that first Arbor Day, Morton's idea spread beyond all the states. Sometimes one good idea can make a difference a real difference. Earth Day

The United States observes Earth Day on April 22th each year, and activities occurring on this day focus on protecting the environment by getting rid of pollution, toxic waste, preserving endangered plants and animals. Twenty million Americans celebrated the first official Earth Day in 1970. Earth day promotes action by asking Americans to commit to conserving water or taking public transportation to work instead of driving a car. The importance of Earth Day now, its message about the personal responsibility we all share to "think globally and act locally."

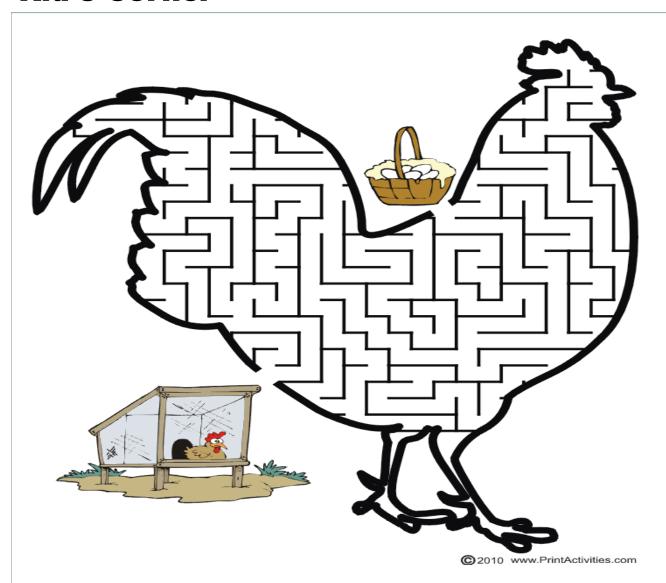
